STATS BY CHAS...

November 2020

48.5mm for November bringing the progressive total to 952.5mm for 2020.

This compares to the same period last year of 50.5mm for November with a progressive total of 831mm for 2019. As of the 25th of November Lake Bellfield is holding 54,260ML or 69% full compared to the same period last year of 57,280ML or 73% full.

The total system is holding 222,530ML or 39.72% full compared to the same period last year of 235,190ML or 41.97% full.

Mount William received 24.4mm for November 2020. (I think there was a malfunction in the recordings between the 9th of November and the 28th of November ?). The highest temperature of 28.6 C was recorded on the 27 of November and the lowest of - 0.2 C was recorded on the 5th of November.

The highest wind speed of 93 km/h was recorded on the 11th of November 2020.



HALLS GAP CFA

The fire restriction period for Northern Grampians Shire, which includes Halls Gap has commenced so anyone considering a fire of any sort should take care to consult "Can I or Can't I", the CFA's information about what the fire restrictions mean, and the additional rules for days of Total Fire Ban. We have already had two Total Fire Ban days this season, so we need to check every day. Even if the weather appears quite mild, the factors of dryness, wind and fuel load may

indicate a fire ban is determined. See https://www.cfa.vic.gov.au/warnings-restrictions/can

before planning any kind of fire.

Most of our active volunteer firefighters have completed the annual safety drills required to respond to emergencies. One new member has undertaken the General Firefighter course and will commence with us this season. We are excited that several others have joined recently, and we will be seeking training programs for them as soon as possible. As always, new volunteers are always welcome – call Peter on 0437 524 716.

Recent grants to the brigade have enabled the fitting of reversing cameras to both fire trucks, making manoeuvring vehicles much safer, especially with pump and hose operators working directly behind the vehicles. We are also training an additional driver and seeking opportunities for others to obtain heavy vehicle endorsements. Members who have previously learnt how to work with breathing apparatus will also be scheduled for a regular update now COVID restrictions allow training with this equipment.

Megs was always willing to assist in local events and would put her hand up at any opportunity to help out raising funds for the Halls Gap community and charity organisations.


Our deepest condolences to Mitch (Daryl), Naomi, Lydia and Michael and their families, she will be sadly missed by those that knew her.


Thanks to Jo Brown for keeping us moving in 2020. Looking forward to more workouts in 2021

Grampians Area Newsletter Parks Victoria

November and December 2020

In Aboriginal culture, Grampians National Park and the surrounding landscape is known as Gariwerd.

Within Gariwerd, distinct seasonal changes occur throughout the year that influence the behaviour of the area's flora and fauna. While visiting keep an eye out for these changes and what makes the seasons unique.

From mid-November to late January many woodland plants are still in flower, including Christmas mint bush, grasstrees, hop goodenia and tea trees. Snakes and lizards are basking in the sun, beetles and moths swarm around lights and butterflies are spotted chasing each other.

In wetland areas, birds such as White Throated Warblers are calling, Honeyeaters are feasting on flowering banksia and Kites prey on mice and locusts. Pygmy possums have young and echidnas are seeking ant nests.

Draft Gariwerd Management Plan

In partnership with Traditional Owner groups, Parks Victoria has now prepared a draft management plan for the Gariwerd landscape, an area that covers Grampians National Park and adjacent parks and reserves.

The draft Greater Gariwerd Landscape Management Plan outlines proposals for the strategic planning of the landscape over the next 15 years to ensure that precious environmental and cultural values of this iconic landscape are preserved for future generations to enjoy.

Cultural heritage assessments



Parks Victoria and Traditional Owners have recently undertaken condition assessments of registered rock art sites at Red Rock (Lil Lil) Bushland Reserve.

These assessments revealed further cultural heritage values, the management of which will be guided by the Greater Gariwerd Landscape Management Plan. In the meantime, signage has been installed advising visitors to not enter these special places.

Planned burning

Recently Park Rangers spent the day undertaking candling of Stringy Bark trees at Ararat Regional Park. Candling is a fuel reduction technique used to reduce the amount of loose bark on Eucalypt trees and therefore the amount of spotting material available during a bushfire event.



Brambuk update

As communicated <u>earlier this year</u>, Parks Victoria has temporarily taken on management of Brambuk in association with our partners: Eastern Maar Aboriginal Corporation, Barengi Gadjin Land Council, and Gunditj Mirring Traditional Owners Aboriginal Corporation.

As well as current operations at Brambuk, we are also working together towards future management of the precinct by a Traditional Owner organisation.

Until then, we are continuing to explore options to reinvigorate this important cultural and visitor site.

Over recent months, this has included undertaking building assessments and essential works, and partially reopening the precinct on 24 November.

The first stage of Brambuk's re-opening includes the visitor information building where national park information services are being delivered. These include map sales, brochures, campground bookings, permits, souvenirs and



interpretive displays, as well as scheduled holiday activities for kids (Junior Ranger Program).

Further assessments and maintenance works for the Cultural Centre are still underway so the building remains temporarily closed. Alternative options for delivering cultural experiences for visitors are currently being investigated.

In great news for Brambuk and the region, the Victorian Budget 2020–21 has allocated \$5.8 million to upgrade buildings, refresh activity spaces, and develop new environmental and cultural programs at the precinct. Further details about these upgrades will be provided by Parks Victoria and the Gariwerd Traditional Owner corporations in due course.

Farewell Ranger Team Leader Mike Stevens

In 1999, a young bushy eyed university graduate named Mike Stevens joined Parks Victoria as part of its then group recruitment program. After 21 years with the agency, and a lengthy list of achievements, we are saying farewell as he heads interstate to further his career in Conservation and Land Management.

During Mikes time with Parks Victoria he secured over \$15 million in conservation investment in the Grampians, helped develop Conservation Action Planning, built large scale fox, feral cat, goat and deer control programs, was heavily involved with brush-tailed rock wallaby protection, helped rediscovered cultural sites and embedded winter burning into fire management.

Speaking to Mike, his most memorable moments include realising the importance of conservation after capturing and holding his first ever Bandicoot during a monitoring program, spending time on-country with Aboriginal staff and Traditional Owners and being caught in a burn over on the back of a fire tanker during his first-ever day at a "planned burn."

Parks Victoria and the Grampians team would like to wish Mike the very best at his new job and thank him for his dedication and passion for conservation in both the Grampians and across Australia.

Fish Falls with FoGGs

In early October Ranger Han Auld and Friends of the Grampians-Gariwerd (FoGGs) installed a bench seat at Fish Falls (with money raised by the now defunct Friends of Zumsteins group) and removed African Weed Orchid along the walking track. The seat is a great addition and the perfect place to sit back, relax and take in nature. Thanks for your hard work FoGGSs!



Weed watch: South African Weed Orchid (Disa bracteate Sw.)

South African Weed Orchid, originally from (you guessed it) South Africa and is a significant environmental weed in Southern Australia. It invades native bushland and replaces ground flora such as native orchids. The flowers are self-pollinating and produce tens of thousands of dust-like seeds that are spread via wind and water. If you see South African Weed Orchid on public land report it to Parks Victoria on 13 1963 or use the Snap Send Solve phone app.

Fyans Creek thistle removal

Over two days during the last week of October volunteers put on their gloves, pulled out the rake hoes and helped with the removal of thistles along the Fyans Creek walking track. The group managed to remove two ute loads of thistles between Brambuk and Tandara Road.

The Fyans Creek infestation is extensive and Parks Victoria will continue to work towards removal of this invasion weed. If you would like to help please send Ranger Han Auld an email: Hannah.auld@parks.vic.gov.au

GRAMPIANS PEAKS TRAIL

Currently under construction, the Grampians Peaks Trail will provide a 160km walking experience that can be undertaken as one 13-day journey, enjoyed as shorter 2-3 day sections.

Airlift operations

On 20 October, helicopter air-lift operations commenced from a helipad near Roses Gap onto the Mt Difficult Range. Workers are airlifting materials to construct the remote Gar hike-in campground. There will be a series of additional air-lifting operations over November, December and January 2021. During these operations some walking tracks in the Mt Difficult area may be closed for visitor safety. Continue to check the Grampians page at www.parks.vic.gov.au any updates.



Keep off closed tracks – Please respect closures

Recently, track construction staff have had to ask several walkers to remove themselves from sections of trail that are under construction. Under law, these walking trails are worksites, where permission and inductions are required to enter. Many sections of the Grampians Peaks Trail are currently unsafe for walkers as they are missing critical safety infrastructure, workers are moving large rocks and trees and heavy machinery may be operating on site.

For safety reasons, it is important that walkers keep off these tracks until the Grampians Peaks Trail is officially open. Walkers will be turned around if found on site and fines can apply if closures are ignored.





Seasonal fauna species

Red-bellied black snake (Pseudechis porphyriacus)

Shiny black, red underneath and growing up to 2 metres in length the red-bellied black is one of Australia's venomous snakes. Active during in the day in the warmer months, and usually found near creeks, wetlands or lagoons. Their diet includes fish, tadpoles, frogs, lizards, snakes (including its own species) and mammals. Generally, a shy species, they freeze to avoid detection (watch your step) and are quick to escape to a protected area if threatened. Normally only aggressive when provoked or unable to escape.

Seasonal flora species Oyster Bay Pine (Callitris rhomboidea)

A deep or silver green conical tree growing up to 6 metres high with leaves 1-4mm long and cones 1-2.5 cm in diameter. Main populations found in the Grampians ranges and Mallee sandhills. Found at all elevations in the Grampians, with stunted growth at high elevations.

Brambuk National Park and Cultural Centre – (the National Park Information Centre) re-opens

Hi everyone,

Just a quick update on Brambuk the National Park & Cultural Centre (Brambuk), in Halls Gap.

Last week the National Park information services and gift shop re-opened in the front building

\$5.8 million budget has been allocated in the Victorian Budget.

As communicated earlier this year, Parks Victoria has temporarily taken on management of Brambuk the National Park and Cultural Centre, and together with our Traditional Owner partners - Eastern Maar Aboriginal Corporation, Barengi Gadjin Land Council and Gunditj Mirring Traditional Owners Aboriginal Corporations, we are working towards future management of the precinct.

Over recent months we have been exploring options to reinvigorate this important cultural and visitor site, and have completed building assessments and essential on-site works.

The first stage of Brambuk's re-opening saw park information services recommence in the entrance building on November 24th, delivered by Parks Victoria staff. Services include park information provision, map and brochure sales, campground and Grampians Peaks Trail bookings, LTO rock climbing and school permits, gifts and souvenirs, ice creams and interpretive displays. We have also scheduled a holiday program for kids throughout January (Junior Ranger Program).

Further assessments and maintenance works for the Cultural Centre building are still underway, so this remains temporarily closed. Alternative options for delivering cultural experiences for visitors are currently being investigated.

In great news for Brambuk and the region, the Victorian Government Budget 2020—21 has allocated \$5.8 million to upgrade buildings, refresh activity spaces, and develop new environmental and cultural programs at the precinct. Further details about these upgrades will be provided by Parks Victoria and the Gariwerd Traditional Owner corporations in due course.

With people again returning to the Grampians/Gariwerd region, it's an exciting time to share this news and I look forward to keeping you updated on developments at Brambuk over the coming months.

Halls Gap PS students and staff would like to wish you all a Merry Christmas and prosperous New Year. Stay safe and take care. See you in 2021!












UNTOLD RESILIENCE

"Untold Resilience" Stories of courage, survival and love from women who have gone before.

Many of you will remember Dot Hoffmann who was a very active member of our community until her husband Errol's health declined and they moved to Melbourne. I caught



up with her last week and learnt that hers is one of 19 stories in a recently published book about women who have come through traumatic experiences to nonetheless thrive. Hers is a story of her childhood experiences in post WW2 Germany, separated from parents, grandparents, months in hospital. Other stories are from stolen children, survivors of domestic abuse and other traumas. Each woman, mostly aged over 70, was interviewed by phone and the stories then written up. The aim is to encourage women who are finding the Covid experience tough, showing them that it is possible to recover and go on.


