
STATS BY CHAS...

October 2017 - Rainfall by Chas: 72.5 mm for October bringing the progressive total for the year to 911.0 mm. This compares to the same period last year of 161.0 mm with a progressive total of 1158.0 mm.

As of the 01 November 2017 Lake Bellfield is holding 73,200 ML or 93% full compared to the same period last year of 71,000 ML or 90% full.

The total system is holding 364,290 ML or 64.91% full compared to the same period last year of 370,000 ML or 65.93% full.

CERT

The Community Emergency Response Team was called out 15 times in October. Once again it was incidents in the National Park that required the most involved responses because the Police and SES were needed alongside the Ambulance. There were 2 calls for people returning from The Pinnacle and 3 calls to McKenzie Falls. Parks Victoria has erected notices at the start of popular walks but visitors continue to walk without water and to wear inappropriate footwear.

Apart from the injured ankles, one man was dragged from the water at the base of McKenzie Falls in an altered conscious state and with the help of friends he climbed to the car-park and then drove off without further contact. CERT arrived at the car-park first and we were told he had gone. And then arrived ambulances from Stawell and Horsham, SES from Stawell and Horsham, Police from Stawell and the Ambulance helicopter from Warrnambool


HALLS GAP RATEPAYERS ASSOCIATION

Most of you will have seen the various articles in the Stawell Times News regarding dogs being kept on leads and secure in homes as well as the article on feeding the wildlife. These issues will be followed up at later meetings with the HGRRA and the Wildlife Action Group (W.A.G) at their future meetings.

One of the other issues covered in the press was that of a Skate Park (for boards and bikes) for the benefit of our local children and tourists children alike. This project has bubbled away for some time now and went into hibernation when Sgt. Paul Russel transferred out of town. Well it now seems there is renewed interest in the idea, with some for the venue and some not so enthusiastic. To that end I am proposing we have a serious discussion at the next HGRRA meeting which will be held on Wednesday the 6th December in the Supper Room (Centenary Hall) at 7.30 pm.

If there are enough people with the enthusiasm to proceed, then I will propose a separate meeting in the New Year, dedicated to the project with a dedicated committee. We would need to raise some funds for the project and organise enough signatures of support for the Council to assist us in obtaining the bulk of the fund needed by way of Government grants.

So, if you think the project is a worthwhile one , make sure you attend the meeting on the $6^{\rm th}$ December"

CFAHALLS GAP

With summer fast approaching the Halls Gap brigade has started to put in place emergency response strate-

gies. Brigade members may be required to attend both local fires and fires where a strike team supports fire fighting at other locations within the state. Brigade Captain Colin Andrews could be deployed as a designated strike team leader, and on selected fire ban days the brigade is required to provide a strike team. On these days the brigade ensures that sufficient volunteers remain available in Halls Gap in the event of a local call out.

Training remains a priority with two members participating in the group exercise at Joel Joel, a lieutenant attending the fire conference at Laharum, two members learning chainsaw procedures, and all brigade members scheduled for 'burnover' protection drill.

Daylight saving has resumed which is a timely reminder that everyone change the batteries in smoke alarms, which fits well into the routine for the fire season.

It is hoped that all residents have their fire plan in place and that all family members are fully conversant with their approach. If you are unsure of how to establish a fire plan for you, your family or your visitors, the CFA website provides several tools and suggestions.

Healthy Parks Healthy People

Hasn't it been a wonderful spring? There have certainly been many opportunities to view a wide range of orchids and wildflowers this year.

With summer approaching, parks staff are now busy preparing for another busy holiday period, and the summer bushfire period. We enjoyed a successful fire conference this year with a range of agencies and community members represented. Special thanks go to the Laharum locals who generously offered to share their recovery stories post Northern Grampians Fire—for some the process still continues, so thanks for the insights and learnings.

Parks staff are currently busy with spring working bees at campgrounds, picnic areas and popular visitor sites.

Project Fire-fighter recruitment has concluded and new staff are currently undertaking final training before joining the team of permanent staff for the summer. They'll be busy clearing fire lines, slashing tracks and preparing burns for next season. You may notice the new 'unimog' tanker getting around town—this will greatly assist with extra water capacity and better safety features than previous models.

Recently, the Wimmera and Hamilton 4x4 Clubs assisted with track clearing activities along some of our seasonal track closures. Each year they assist to get tracks open for the November Cup weekend, by clearing trees and opening seasonally closed gates. We also had club members assist with volunteer camp hosting at Boreang campground over the Long weekend. We greatly appreciate the assistance these clubs generously provide.



Parks Victoria, Aboriginal Traditional Owners and Cliffcare (Victoria's Rock-climbing access representatives), recently issued a notice to cease all bolting within the Black Range area west of the Grampians National Park. Unfortunately a new route had been bolted only a centimetres away from Aboriginal art in a significant and well known shelter. New legislation has seen significant changes to the Aboriginal heritage act and damage to significant sites now carries heavy penalties. With the recent increase in sport climbing's popularity there have been numerous new routes placed on public land. Discussions have now begun with Parks Victoria, Aboriginal Victoria, Barengi Gadjin land council, , Victorian Climbing Club and other industry representatives to find sustainable and respectful solutions to this issue.

FLOOD RECOVERY: Most seasonal tracks have now re-opened however there are some tracks that require further repair works under the flood recovery works packages prior to re-opening in the new year, such as Redman Rd. See our weekly road report for further detail.

FIRE RECOVERY: Works have commenced to replace the roof on the 'Blue' cottage at Zumsteins and the orange cottage is not far off. Contractors are also in the process of developing new interpretive signage for the area. Works continue on Cultural Heritage management plans for the repair and replacement of walking tracks and campgrounds in the northern Grampians.

GRAMPIANS PEAKS TRAIL

Existing track upgrade works were recently completed in the southern Grampians, and crews have now shifted focus to the Chatauqua peak Summit access. Works are also scheduled for the Stapylton Summit and Mt Zero area in coming months.

Works are scheduled to continue on Mt William and the plateau until the end of the year.

All in all thousands of new rock steps have been installed already which will provide a sustainable walking experience well into the future. The GPT is scheduled to open in late 2019 once planning and construction of new trail is complete.



GRAMPIANS WILDFLOWER SHOW

Our unique **Grampians Wildflower Walkabout 2017 Event** was enjoyed by many visitors and locals, experiencing guided tours and walks which happened over the first weekend of October. The event was met with great enthusiasm. Over 80 wildflower species were exhibited with many that are endemic and occur here and nowhere else in the world. This is a great introduction to our flora that are truly indigenous and not cultivars for gardens.

A variety of activities were available for wildflower enthusiasts and for those who simply enjoy the beauty of nature, to get up close and personal with the flowers, plants and fauna of the area—Such as:

- wildflower based art and craft displays by local artists
- A children's corner and Devonshire Tea
- A photographic exhibition by John Tiddy
- Lynn Stone creative exhibition and demonstration
- Wimmera Catchment Management Authority community engagement officer Rae Talbot and Blake Clark of Blakes Bushfood Café at Brambuk Cultural Centre talked about their experiences working with Aboriginal people and their cultural uses of plants.
- The show also gave visitors a chance to see plants in the 'wild' with guided walks through the Halls Gap Botanical Garden and tagalong car tours to wildflower and orchid hotspots.

Comments were made such as "The guided tours were brilliant. " "This is so accessible. I don't have to walk for miles and days to see these species."

"A beautiful display". "I came from England the second week of October to see the wildflowers in the Grampians. I got your walks sheets from the Tourist Office in Halls Gap, and had a very good week following the routes suggested. This message is just to ask you to pass on a big thank you to those who put together all the info and described the routes. I have been to California, and South Africa, and the Alps in Europe, to look at the flowers, but nowhere have I found such good help to see so much in a short time."

An enthusiastic (but small) group of locals worked hard to present this iconic event as part of the Halls Gap calendar again this year. We have group members with extensive botanical knowledge, so plant identification, collection and labelling is managed. A great big thank you to all those who supported and promoted this local happening. We do need more volunteers for this to continue.

HALLS GAP PRIMARY SCHOOL

A few weeks back, our Grades 4 to 6 students had a lesson that was a double whammy in terms of making links with the community and our beautiful surroundings. Denis, who is an



insect expert, along with Anthea and Cheryl who are all from WAMA came along to the Botanical Gardens to teach the students about Life on a Gum Tree. It was fascinating! There were so many wonderful creepy-crawlies that we normally would not take any notice of. The students collected samples (dead and alive) and took them back to Denis who was able to identify anything at all! His knowledge astounded us. He even knows the Latin names for these little critters.

Halls Gap PS is very pleased to be involved with this WAMA project. It is not often we get the opportunity to have such expertise right in our



very own back yard. We are going to be making our very own gum tree with all of its own insects, bugs and spiders.

Our Prep and Grade 1 students had a wonderful visit to the Halls Gap police station. The kids really appreciated Karen showing them around and teaching them about how the police communicate, what they have to wear to work, the special equipment they use and about some of the jobs they do each day. They were even allowed in the chicken coop!

At the moment we are reviewing our school's emergency management plan. The Department of Education and Training, in consultation with the CSIRO has found that we are in an area at very high risk of bushfire. This probably will not be any surprise to lots of community members out there. However, because we are a Category 1 school we are closed on Code Red days, and offer a relocation site to our students on days that are forecast Severe and Extreme. Currently our relocation site is the Halls Gap Centennial Hall.

The school's fundraising activities continue to be of vital importance to the running of school programs, purchasing of equipment and resources, and the upkeep of the school's grounds and buildings. We have recently had some new doors fitted into the main rear entrance of the school. We have also started the process of levelling our oval, which is starting to suffer from lots of wear and tear – kids having fun, and getting some exercise! This levelling will take lots of dirt and we would even like to consider putting in a sprinkler system and grass.

Our 'Halls Gap Market' has been running for many years and is the key fundraiser for the school. It is a great chance to come along, say hi to our volunteer parents and families, and buy one of our fantastic egg and bacon rolls. We have many clever stall-holders who all make or grow their goods. GRAMPIANS WALKING TRACK SUPORT GROUP

The Grampians Walking Track Support Group was formed by our convenor, David Witham, in 2003 to attract and coordinate volunteer interest in maintaining and improving walking tracks within the Grampians National Park. We operate under the broad umbrella of the Community Association of Halls Gap which also undertakes other activities such as the Wildflower Show and Halls Gap Botanic Garden and provides support for Run the Gap, Halls Gap Landcare Group and the Jazz Festival.

What do we do?

In partnership with Parks Victoria, we carry out vital maintenance on popular walking tracks, such as trimming vegetation, cleaning water runoffs and clearing fallen timber.

Most of our works are carried out through the efforts of walking clubs:

- Grampians Bushwalking Club Heatherlie and Beehive Falls Walking Tracks
- Warrnambool Bushwalking Club Mount Abrupt and Chimney Pots Walking Tracks
- Melbourne Bushwalkers various tracks
- Victorian Mountain Tramping Club tracks

Over the last two years these clubs have contributed 61 person days to our program. Recently the Wimmera Bushwalking Club has joined our program and will undertake works on the Mount Zero and Mackenzie River Walking Tracks over the next few months.
