STATS BY CHAS...

January 2021 - Rainfall by Chas;

165 mm for January. This compares to the same period last year of 36 mm for January. This is the highest recording for January since the flood year of 2011 (294mm).

As of the 27th January Lake Bellfield is holding 51,030ML or 65% full compared to the same period last year of 53,410ML or 68% full.

The total system is holding 194,000ML or 34.62% full compared to the same period last year of 197,710ML or 35.29% full.

Mount William received 85.8mm for January 2021 (once again I think there was a malfunction in the recordings between the 1st and 19th of January). The highest temperature of 31.4 C was recorded on the 24th of January and the lowest of 2.3 C was recorded on the 27th of January. The highest wind speed of 98 km/h was recorded on the 25th of January 2021.


The Halls Gap Community Garden is open to all locals and visitors to Halls Gap. There is no need to work in the garden to come down and take away herbs, salads or vegetables.

So far it has been a cool and quiet summer with few call outs, although we have been on standby with several days of Total Fire



Ban. Along with other brigades in the Stawell Group, we are rostered to nominate a "strike team" on selected Total Fire Ban days. This involves setting up a team ready to travel to support a neighbouring area, as well as ensuring sufficient firefighters are available in the event of a local incident.

We are pleased that training has recommenced (again) with drills and practice scheduled for the first and third Wednesday of each month.

After a long delay due to COVID restrictions, the election meeting for our Brigade Management Team will take place on Wednesday 17 February.

All positions will be vacated and a new team will be selected for the remainder of the two year appointment period, concluding in June 2022. Our brigade has a captain and three lieutenants who take responsibility for brigade operations including maintenance and training. We also have a secretary/treasurer, and officers for communications, community engagement, health and safety and Fire Equipment Maintenance. We are expecting changes among the Brigade Management Team as some existing members have indicated they will not be renominating.

Campfires continue to be of concern to the brigade. Rules apply to fires on private property and public land but these are repeatedly ignored. Volunteer firefighters are often called to inappropriate fires which are too large, not properly contained, are in the wrong place or are left unattended. In response to the Greater Gariwerd Landscape Draft Management plan we have suggested that a seasonal ban be considered for the future. We also had some members participate in a discussion recently with Parks Victoria, DELWP, Forest Fire Management, Police and CFA to share ideas on improving management, control and communication about campfires in and around the Greater Gariwerd Landscape.

Thanks to individuals and businesses who display signs and alert visitors and guests on Total Fire Ban days. To check the fire danger rating and Total Fire Ban status for Halls Gap, which is in the Wimmera Fire District, see https://www.cfa.vic.gov.au/ warnings-restrictions/wimmera-fire-district

There is still a month of summer to go, and the fire season will extend well into autumn, so please continue to take care with fire and ensure you are ready to put in place your Bushfire Plan, see https://www.cfa.vic.gov.au/plan-prepare/your-bushfire-plan.

We are very happy to report that we have been granted a large proportion of what we applied to the Department of the Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP) for last year. We will be able to completely revamp our ageing and inadequate watering system, build a new shed to be our office and library, purchase a portable

toilet for volunteers, have a series of information boards about how the traditional owners used different plants for food and medical uses. We will have to wait for connection to electricity and solar panels and art to accompany the indigenous signs, all of which we will apply for in future grant opportunities. But we will be busy enough with these. Just have to wait for the money to actually arrive so we can sign contracts.

The new Peaks Trail will be coming through the garden. You may already have seen the arrow signs, but coming soon are improvement to the paths their walkers will take and some work on the narrow gates to make sure they stand up to the extra traffic. We need to ensure they continue to self-close so we keep the deer and wallabies out.

It's probably time to give you some background information about the garden and its history.

The Botanic Garden is situated on approximately 2 hectares of Crown Land administered by the DELWP, and managed on its behalf by the Halls Gap Caravan Park and Recreation Reserve Committee of Management. Funding for the garden mainly comes from the CAHG and the HG Rec Reserve. Grants have been sought from various bodies over the years, mostly successfully.

Prior to the Garden's establishment in 1996, the land had no specific use and was a degraded area of manna gum and swamp gum forest with middle storey scrub, some shrubs, ferns and rushes, but a preponderance of bracken, exotic weeds and plants from early settlement.

A Federal Government grant of \$26,000 was obtained in 1996 under the Forest Ecotourism Program for replanting with indigenous plants, for constructing about 1 km. of walking tracks, together with a footbridge across Stony Creek, a wetland boardwalk and an information shelter, and for interpretive signage and plant labelling.

Then came the severe drought in the early 2000s. In 2004 it was recognised that there was a need for a revitalisation of the Botanic Garden project. The small core of continuing volunteers had dwindled markedly in both numbers and energy levels, owing to the ageing process, together with the loss of some plants resulting from the drought and grazing animals.

Since then a lot of work has gone in. Much effort has gone into new plants, keeping existing plants alive, weeding and mowing. The long drought from about 2000 to 2010 had a solid impact on the garden, as did the flood of 2011. Outside volunteers such as Conservation Volunteers, Work for the Dole, Drought Relief teams have helped on short term projects. The garden was fenced in 2008 to keep deer and macropods out (essential!), with decorative gates. Parks Vic donated us some no longer needed fencing: all we had to do was dig it up and install it! And Wayne Dickinson created the beautiful main gate. After the 2011 flood the NG Shire helped hugely to restore our paths, and the Recreation Reserve committee paid for tree removal. A shed and water tank were installed, and some improvements to the water supply were made.

Recent improvements: Grants and gifts have enabled us to build a large shade shelter and furnish it, install a solar powered fountain and pond in memory of the builders of the water supply fluming to Stawell, establish

various attractions for young children and more. One of our volunteers (who actually lives in Ballarat but has a cottage here) has given many of our plants labels. We also have some signs with information about plant families scattered through the garden.

We look forward to working with WAMA who are establishing a garden out on the plain at Pomonal. They will be able to grow plants which object to our cloudy valley, we can grow shade loving plants which they can't. We also will be working in cooperation with Brambuk who hope to improve their garden too.

We are very much in need of volunteers. In 2021 we will be holding working bees on the 2nd and 4th Fridays from 9.30am, but some volunteers just come when they can.

MT VICTORY ROAD MAINTENANCE WORKS, regional roads HALLS GAP TO REED PICNIC AREA (REED LOOKOUT TURN-OFF)-CLOSURE INFORMATION

We're making Mt Victory Road safer for road users by resealing the road surface.

This is an important operation and involves crews working across an 11-kilometre section of the road between Halls Gap and Reed Picnic Area (adjacent to turn-off to Reed Lookout).

When to expect us

Our crews will be working from Monday 8 February to Friday 12 February 2021, weather permitting.

How will these works impact you?

This section of Mt Victory Road will be closed to traffic at all times during these works. Only emergency service vehicle access will be maintained.

The road needs to be closed due to the volume of heavy vehicles that require clear access along the route, helping us to safely and efficiently complete the reseal works.

Access to some parts of the Grampians National Park will be limited while the road is closed. The main sites impacted by the road closure are:

- **Wonderland Carpark**
- **Sundial Carpark**
- Boroka Lookout
- Mt Rosea Carpark
- Stony Creek Camp
- MacKenzie Falls (from Halls Gap)
- Zumsteins (from Halls Gap)

Bush walks from Halls Gap to lookouts at Wonderland Carpark must be completed on foot during this time, as the road closure prevents vehicles from being dropped off at midway points.

An alternative route between Halls Gap and Wartook, MacKenzie Falls and Zumsteins is available by using Mt Zero Road to Roses Gap and back along Roses Gap Road.

During works, heavy vehicles will be travelling through the Halls Gap township, predominantly between Mt Victory Road and Grampians Road to the north side of Halls Gap, and using the parking area adjacent to the

Grampians Road-Mt Zero Road intersection as a collection point for materials.

We appreciate your patience while we work to improve Mt Victory Road.

2. Any other items pertinent to the AGM (any items for consideration are to be forwarded to the Secretary two weeks prior to the 28th Feb).



Vitamin D

Consumer guide



Vitamin D plays an essential role in bone health. By improving the absorption of bone-building calcium from the intestine, vitamin D is important to the growth and maintenance of a strong skeleton. Vitamin D also helps to control calcium levels in the blood and maintain muscle strength.



Vitamin D and sunshine

For most Australians, sunshine is the main source of vitamin D. Vitamin D is produced when our skin is exposed to ultraviolet B (UVB) light emitted by the sun. The amount of sun exposure required to produce adequate levels vitamin D is relatively low. However, many Australians do not have adequate vitamin D levels, especially during winter. Required sun exposure times will vary based on season, location, area of skin exposed and skin type. In summer, exposure is best at mid morning or mid afternoon (outside peak UV times). In winter, longer exposure times are needed, preferably around midday.

It is important to balance the need for sun exposure to produce adequate vitamin D, at the same time avoiding the risk of skin damage from too much exposure. When the UV index is above 3 (all states during summer and some states in the winter months), you should use sun protection measures (hat, sunscreen, clothing, sunglasses and staying in the shade) if you are outdoors for more than a few minutes. In summer, most Australian adults will maintain adequate vitamin D levels during typical day to day outdoor activities. Sun protection isn't needed in autumn or winter in states where the UV index is below 3 for most of the day. For more information about UV index where you live, see the website of Cancer Council Australia.


