STATS BY CHAS: November 2021

70.5 mm for November bringing the progressive total for 2021 to 1087.5 mm.

This compares to the same period last year of 48.5 mm for November with a progressive total of 952.5 mm for 2020.

As of the 24th of November 2021 Lake Bellfield is holding 60,390ML or 77% full compared to the same period last year of 54,260ML or 69% full.

The total system is holding 241.620ML or 43.12 % full. This compares to the same period last year of 222,530ML or 39.72% full.

Mount William received 110.0 mm for November 2021. The highest temperature of 23.1 C was recorded on the 29th of November and the lowest of - 0.2 C was recorded on the 16th of November 2021. The highest wind speed of 102 km/h was recorded on the 18th November 2021.

I'm sure that readers of this newsletter have walked past the History Room

in the front of the Centenary Hall many times. But have you been inside to see of what our history was made, or how the vast number of photographs came

to be there? Well, as there has just been a change made in the Society's management, I thought it would be timely to tell you how it all began. Heatherlie Quarry was the catalyst. Back in 1982 the stone cottages had lost their roofs and the windows and doors were beginning to crumble.



With the surrounds in a sad state, a small group of locals decided something had to be done. So the Society was formed and in our first year almost \$1,000 was donated through fund raising activities. Then our aim to restore the stone cottages came to a sudden halt for much of the Grampians was declared a national park and the Quarry fell within its boundary.

Meanwhile, as the old log cabin in the caravan park was no longer in use, we were given permission to use it as our headquarters. Apart from sorting out old photographs which were donated by many visitors who had once been honeymooners in Halls Gap, we repainted the two old campers' lounge rooms and installed security grills on the windows. Alas, our new home was not for long as new lessees of the caravan park wanted the log cabin back! So we packed up the collection and set up a new home in one of the change rooms at the back of the Hall.

With the establishment of the Grampians National Park, we set to work consulting with their staff and obtaining grants for a number of projects. The stone cottages were restored and a series of interpretive signs were installed to help visitors better understand the significance of the area. After years of the signs fading - in some cased stolen - a new set of signs have recently been installed. Another project was titled 'Signs of the Past' with other widespread interpretive signs at places of significance. We also held a number of celebratory events out in the Park - 120th anniversary of the commencement of the Stawell Water Supply System, the 100th anniversary of the Mafeking Gold Rush and, closer to home, the centenary of a school in Halls Gap with the children dressed in the fashion of the day. Another big achievement was the 2006 publication of 'Victoria's Wonderland', a history of the Grampians, which has proved very popular. We recently had a 3rd reprint of the book.



When the Hall was enlarged early this century, the Hall Committee of Management gave the Society a new home. We were even able to consult with the builder to ensure the History Room could accommodate the original lounge from the Mountain Grand Guesthouse. Transporting the long lounge was quite a feat with one end supported on the back of a ute while six strong men supported the other end and "walked" the lounge down the street to the Hall! At last we had somewhere to set up our displays and welcome visitors to learn more about the Grampians since Major Mitchell climbed Mt William

in July 1836. In the couple of years before Covid's many lockdowns, Chas Mangle would open the History Room to the public most afternoons, (a service much appreciated by the general public if the donations box is anything to go by.) However, times change and our original membership of 38 in 1983 has now dropped to just eight members. (The good news is that we now have four volunteers, who with Chas, open the History Room daily for the public.) With more work now being done by fewer people, we decided to cease being a separate incorporated body. We have now moved under the umbrella of the Community Association of Halls Gap Inc., just like the Grampians Film Society and our Botanic Garden group; one big happy family, but do come and join us if you would like to be involved. The Northern Grampians Resilience Project is seeking participants to discuss community needs and perspectives on bushfire preparedness. Researchers from the University of Melbourne are conducting a workshop via Zoom on 8 December from 6:30 to 8:30pm. Please email andrea.rawluk@unimelb.edu.au to express interest in participating

The Brigade Management Team met on 1 December to schedule summer activities. We will continue training on the first and third Wednesday of each month, commencing at 7:00 pm. We also propose a special session on Monday 20 December at 7:00 pm to ensure all available volunteers have completed their entrapment drill before Christmas. This is a vital safety procedure to protect firefighters in vehicles using insulated curtains and overhead sprays.

Other summer activities will include locating and checking fire hydrants. In Halls Gap these are embedded in the ground and are identified by blue reflectors in the road surface and red and white pickets on the roadside or close to the outlet. Most outlets are concealed by a metal cover. In the event of fire, brigade members attach a stand-pipe in order to connect firefighting hoses. If you notice a fire hydrant buried under soil or vegetation, or a damaged reflector or marker, please let us know by telephone, SMS so we can arrange to have it checked or cleared. (0437 524 716).

In addition to our regular training schedule the brigade is planning two important meetings during the first half of next year. On Wednesday 16 February at 7:00 pm we'll have a general meeting to discuss succession and leadership, then on Wednesday 18 May at 7:00 pm we will meet to elect a new brigade management team for 2022 to 2024.

Now we are meeting face to face, and can train together, it would be great to be introducing new volunteers. We welcome potential firefighters as well as other supporters for logistics, maintenance and communications. Please call Peter if interested - 0437 524 716.

We are currently running on Mondays from 9-30am for a day of social activities and on Thursdays from 9-30am for our project sessions in the workshop.


We will be starting some all-inclusive sessions for our female members to attend with us within the new year.

Wildlife with Neil Macumber:- White-winged Chough (Corcorax melanorhamphos)

Previously known as Black Jays or Black Magpies. Aboriginals in NSW called them Waybung.

Size:- 430-470mm (very similar in size to a Magpie)

Description:- Male and Female are similar. The body is black with large white wing patches that are not seen until the birds take flight. The bill is pointed but decurved, and is black as are the legs. The eye is red with an orange inner ring and seems to be more prominent when aroused or threatened by a magpie, currawong etc.



Voice:- Mellow whistles and piping. Aggressive throaty clicks. Alarm call is a loud grating scream.

Habitat:- Open forest with leaf litter and little understorey, such as scrublands, tall mallee and mulga and Eucalyptus woodlands. Also farmland, road sides, road verges and pine plantations. They are often seen on road edges and take flight as car approach.

Food:- Consists of mainly insects and their larvae, those of scarab beetles are a favourite. Some small vertebrates including frogs and mice. Also seeds and some vegetable matter.

Habits:- Communal living in family groups of 5-20 that share all aspects of daily life. They are sedentary and groups rarely wander far from the home range, and are largely terrestrial. In Autumn/Winter they can join up into communal flocks of over 100 birds. Some groups will steal babies from adjacent groups and raise them as their own.



Breeding:- is between August and December, sometimes earlier after rain in arid regions. One brood per female, large groups may produce 2 -3 broods per season. All group members contribute to nest building and incubation.

Nest:- is a large bowl-shaped structure, made from mud reinforced with fibre, in dry seasons mud may be substituted with cattle or emu dung: plastered to a horizontal branch, from 2mtrs to 13mtr above ground.

Eggs:- 3-5 sometimes 6-10 if more than one female lay. Many of the babies get taken by predators.

Distribution:- Confined to Eastern and Southern Australia from around Ingham in QLD, down

the coast and includes most of NSW, all of Victoria and across the Nullabor to slightly west of Eucla SA.


